History

The Santa Clarita Valley Branch of AAUW was organized on July 22, 1968 – almost 20 years before Santa Clarita became a city. Initially, 40 vibrant, dynamic women joined and today the membership has more than doubled, with six Charter Members still active. The Santa Clarita Valley is located 35 miles northwest of downtown Los Angeles and includes the communities of Valencia, Newhall, Stevenson Ranch, Canyon Country, Castaic, Saugus, Agua Dulce, Acton and Val Verde.

Contributions

Throughout the years, the SCV AAUW branch has contributed significantly to the community and to women's causes by -

- Partnering with the College of the Canyons (COC), to initiate the Women's Conference, College Night and Career Day
- Sponsoring political "Candidates' Discussion" nights
- Contributing to the establishment of the local Food Pantry
- Nurturing the docent program at the Placerita Nature Center
- Encouraging higher education for women by awarding scholarships to COC
- 1999-2010 Conducted Math/Science/Workshops Conference for 7&8th grade girls

Activities

SCV AAUW members begin the year in September with a Membership Brunch, followed by Program meetings in October, November, January and February. December's activities include a Holiday Gathering, and the April ventures include the Women In History presentation and the Tech Trek awards. In May, the branch celebrates the Installation of new officers.

Membership

AAUW Funds

One of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women, AAUW is providing \$4.5 million in funding for more than 250 fellowships, grants, and special awards to outstanding women in the 2008-09 academic year. Legal Advocacy Fund

LAF - was established in 1981 and works to end sex discrimination in the workplace and in higher education, through community and campus outreach programs, a resource library and online advocacy tools, and various research reports. In collaboration with the Public Policy and Government Relations department, LAF seeks amicus curiae opportunities in workplace sex discrimination cases. LAF also provides support to workplace sex discrimination cases that have the potential to make a difference for all women.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Women in History

The WOMEN IN HISTORY program has been an integral part of the education of our public elementary and middle school children since 1987. Beginning in March, in partnership with individual PTAs, members perform five or six costumed dramatizations of influential women in history - some famous, some forgotten in time. As one of our most popular programs, over 225 women participate each year, bringing knowledge and respect for the accomplishments of these historical role models. Every April, a presentation is also made for the seniors of the Santa Clarita Valley as a culmination of the program.

Tech Trek

TECH TREK is a California AAUW activity that offers 7th grade girls a one-week residential math, science, and technology summer camp on a university campus. It provides a fun and supportive environ2009ment for girls to explore and expand their interests in these areas, with hands-on activities, projects, and field trips led by experienced teachers and guest presenters. AAUW programs like Tech Trek Science Camp for Girls are changing the status quo across the country. Connecting young women with like minded peers and mentors has a powerful effect on the lives and career choices of future generations. In fact survey results of girls who had participated show that AAUW Tech Trek had been the most influential personal or academic experience of their middle school years. An overwhelming 96% of our Tech Trek girls are currently enrolled in college, and all credit Tech Trek for encouraging interest and increasing confidence in their ability to succeed in math and science areas.

STEM STARS

The STEMS STARS program provides opportunities for former Tech Trek girls that will encourage them to continue taking math and science classes, while providing the branch contact and follow-up with our campers all the way through high school. Participants will have the opportunity to meet and form personal contacts with women working in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) fields and to become aware of the qualifications needed to be hired. The girls, from 8th through 12th grade, will attend several field trips and excursions throughout the year to expose them to different STEM careers and educational requirements.
