# **Public Policy Committee Announces Positions on November Ballot Measures**

The AAUW California Public Policy Committee has reviewed the 12 propositions that will be on the November ballot and is making a **SUPPORT** recommendation on 7 that relate to our priorities and mission

- **Prop 14** Stem Cell Research: Approves a bond for \$5.5 billion to support continued stem cell research
- **Prop 15** Property Taxes: Large commercial properties over \$3 million will be assessed at current market value
- **Prop 16** Affirmative Action: Reinstates race, ethnicity and country of origin as considerations for school admittance and government employment
- **Prop 17** Voting for Parolees: Allows people on parole to vote once their prison sentence has been completed
- **Prop 18** Voting at 17: Allows 17-yr olds to register and vote in primary if they will be 18 by the general election
- **Prop 21** Rent Control: Authorizes local governments to place rent control measures on houses older than 15 years
- **Prop 25** Cash Bail: SB10 relies on risk assessment in determining if a suspect will be held in custody instead of cash bail; a "yes" vote keeps SB10

#### The committee takes "NO POSITION" on:

Prop 19 – Property Taxes

Prop 20 – Parole Restrictions

Prop 22 – Gig Workers

Prop 23 – Dialysis Clinics

Prop 24 – Consumer Privacy

Please remember: branches do not have to adopt the supported measures but they cannot oppose them; similarly, individual members may choose to support or oppose any propositions, but they may not act as representatives of AAUW.

## Vote by Mail (VBM) Ballot Info

All registered voters in California will receive a Vote-by-Mail (VBM) ballot in early October. You have choices for using that ballot:

- 1: Complete it and mail it in if you do this, mail early. *Ballots must be postmarked by November 3.* They have 17 days after that date to reach the Registrar's office, but the postmark must be by November 3. If you put it in a mailbox on November 3 it will not be postmarked in time. Be early!
- 2: Complete the ballot and drop it in an official drop box. Your Registrar of Voters will post locations of drop boxes. The Registrar regularly collects the ballots from the boxes.
- **3:**Take your completed ballot to a Vote Center and hand it in. You don't have to use the VBM ballot. You can vote in person and just hand in your unused ballot at a Vote Center.



## Make Conscious Commitment to AAUW's Work for Racial Justice and Societal Change

This election gives all of us an opportunity to expand our thinking and vision by making a conscious commitment to AAUW's work for racial justice and societal change.

The coronavirus pandemic has disproportionately impacted Black Americans. We are seeing a call to address police brutality. In the face of these historic challenges, a record number of Black women are running for Congress, determined to work for change.

The Center of Women and Politics (CAWP) reports that Black women are nearly 8% of the U.S. population, but 4.3% of Congress – only 22 out of 435 Representatives and 1 out of 100 Senators. They are underrepresented in statewide executive's jobs and among mayors and city councils.

This November, in addition to federal, state and county elections, local elections are on the ballot: cities, school districts, and water districts. There may be Black women or women of other ethnicities on the ballot in your area. You can support women of color who are running for office in your community, state and nation. Be aware. Create an environment of inclusion. Make an effort to meet and talk with these candidates. Commend them for stepping up. Listen to their stories and their goals. Ensure they are included in election discussions and activities.
